

This passuk tells us that the core of Yitzchak's being and purpose, and his most important achievement was that he was the son of Avraham. Yitzchak's greatness was that he continued Avraham's legacy.

Sometimes children of great people buckle under the weight of living in the shadow an illustrious parent, but not so Yitzchak. He revelled in being the son of the great Avraham. Yitzchak's greatness was in continuing and building on the greatness of Avraham. The toldot of Yitzchak, the essence of his being, was in continuity.

And this too is the greatness and the impact of the Yavneh Foundation.

The Yavneh Foundation bequeaths to Yavneh so much that is new and exciting; new buildings and new programs. The Foundation helps us to grow and evolve. But the most important work that the Foundation does is in ensuring Jewish continuity, in enabling Yavneh to be Yitzchak. FAREWELL MESSAGE FROM Benji Jotkowitz

It has been a very rewarding experience serving as a Yavneh Foundation board member since 2011 and its Chair since 2014. I have enjoyed dealing with you, our donors and give much thanks for your financial support and generosity over the years.

The giving of tzedakah is termed 'planting', as in the words of the prophet Hosea it states "Sow charity for yourself and you will reap according to kindness".

This concept can be understood further with a well-known Talmudic story about planting. The scholar Choni HaMeagel was walking along the road when he saw a man planting a carob tree. "After how many years will this tree give fruit?" Choni asked. "It will not give fruit until 70 years have passed," answered the man. "Do you think you will live another 70 years in order to benefit from the fruit of this tree?" Choni asked. The man responded: "When I came into this world, it was full of carob trees. Just as my ancestors planted for me, I too am planting for my descendants."

Like the man with the tree, we too must plan(t) for the future! At times the Yavneh Foundation will ask for your support to allow it to prepare for the future financially. Other times it will ask for your commitment to help with specific capital building projects, scholarships or teacher development programs.

We know that a flame never goes out when it lights another candle – it only gives, and makes the flame brighter. The same is true for people. When individuals contribute to a community, the light only grows. When we read about how individuals brought gifts to the Mishkan we are acknowledging all the "flames" that light up the room.

I am thankful to Dion Epstein and Karen Franks for taking over the leadership of the Yavneh Foundation and wish them together with the Board much Hatzlacha for their important work ahead. Thank you to Executive Director – Tanya Shaltiel for all her hard work and dedication.

MESSAGE FROM FOUNDATION CHAIR **Dion Epstein**

Dear Friends.

I would say we are living in unprecedented times, but the truth is there is a precedent for the predicament that the collective Jewish nation in Israel and the Diaspora are currently facing.

Exactly 100 years ago, Adolf Hitler led the Beer Hall Putsch with two thousand Nazis marching in Munich to seize power. While the coup failed, it brought Hitler to the attention of Germany and the world. 10 years later in 1933 he became Chancellor and seized power shortly thereafter. The devastating effects of allowing hatred, ignorance and propaganda to rapidly take root in a democratic society are deeply ingrained in our people and especially in our Melbourne community made up mainly of descendants of survivors.

Whilst the protests on our streets and the hate speech being disseminated is distressing, they are a wake-up call that we must fight hatred and ignorance with all our being. Our people stand for life and light, not death and darkness and it is apt that as we enter Channukah 5784. we vigorously strive to be an Or La'Govim, a beacon of light for all that is good and moral in this world. Having been through existential challenges of my own recently, I am a firm believer that with a positive mindset, a focus on action, and faith in Hashem, all will be good in the end

As Jeremy Leibler so aptly said at the recent Foundation event, which included a deeply meaningful look at our alumni in Israel, the best way for the community to fight the misinformation is to have a solid grounding in our history and traditions.

The Yavneh product is exceptionally unique in our community. Our educational model is built firmly around developing a knowledge and love of Torah and exploring the modern world and Zionism through a religious lens. Not only do we see Hashem's role in the miraculous story of the State of Israel's establishment and its growth into a technologically advanced society, but we also explore how it resolves Halachic challenges in this society. This includes technical and ethical questions around medicine, genetics, and the use of modern appliances to name a few, as well as moral dilemas in war. such as that posed to Rav Yosef Tzvi Rimon recently about whether soldiers having a short leave of absence could drive on Shabbat to see loved ones before re-entering the life and death situation in Gaza.

Most of us are understandably focusing our philanthropy on supporting Israel in this crisis. At the same time, we are starting to band together as a community to confront antisemitism at home. Apart from our unity,

one positive that has come from this is that we have a more acute focus on the importance of being an informed Jew and being able to challenge factual inaccuracy and moral bankruptcy intelligently and confidently.

We are bleeding as a nation, but we have been bleeding young Jewish souls out of our education system for some time now, due to affordability and lifestyle choices, competition from other schools and the dilution of Torah as our blueprint for a Jewish life.

We must therefore arrest this and nurture brilliant minds, critical and creative thinkers, and leaders who are proud of their heritage like Avraham Avinu, Moshe Rabbenu, David Ha'Melech, Ezra & Nechemiah, Yehuda HaMaccabee, Menachem Begin and Rabbi Jonathan Sacks, all of whom were steeped in knowledge and faith, unequivocal in their beliefs and willing to fight with all their oratory and physical capacities for a strong Jewish Nation.

At a time when many in the community are re-assessing causes they have supported that have proved themselves to be no friends of the Jews in our time of need, I ask that you be unequivocal in your continued and increasing vigour to support the most important asset we can invest in - the Jewish Neshama and the Jewish mind.

This in my opinion is one of the best ways of supporting Israel, as has been demonstrated by our alumni. Those that stay in Melbourne or elsewhere in the Diaspora are loud advocates of Israel and dedicated to community service. leadership, their Jewish identity and Jewish continuity. For those choosing to make Aliya (we have one of the highest rates of any school in the world), we see them serving in the IDF, working across all aspects of the modern Israeli society and as with all our graduates, they are imbued with a passion and commitment for our Jewish heritage and Gemillut Chesed which they take into their homes and workplaces.

Last year the VCE study Centre was opened. thanks to the generous support of donors, Foundation members and Avi Gilboa in particular. It enabled a specialised and focused study environment for VCE students to nurture critical thinkers, a lifelong thirst for knowledge and to maximise each student's potential. Next year we will embark on a seminal project that targets the other end of the Yavneh journey - the Early Learning Centre. A purpose-built facility housed on the Elsternwick campus will be built providing

a modern, warm, and stimulating sensory environment, with smaller teacher-student ratios and an invigorated learning program grounded in a love for Hebrew and Judaism.

Case studies have shown that investment in early learning centres are a good determinant for both the quality and quantity of students entering the primary school. Kinder students and parents will soak in the unique atmosphere of the "big school". Now more than ever we must prepare the foundations for a lifelong love of learning, both Secular and Jewish. With the realisation of this project, we will be exceptionally well placed to provide the launching pad for the journey within school. just as we have tried to do with the VCE study centre providing the launching pad into life beyond school.

We thank all our Foundation members for their support to date, for your continued support, and we encourage you to reach out to your networks to invite others to support our school. Despite our small school size, our contribution to the broader Jewish community, to Australian society and to Israel punches well above our weight.

I want to thank Benji Jotkowitz, the outgoing Chair, for over a decade of remarkable community service in building the Foundation to the strong membership it currently has and its immense contribution to Yavneh's infrastructure, programs and scholarships. We wish him luck in his new role as Mizrachi President and look forward to working together closely and collaboratively to drive forward in our shared vision.

I'd also like to thank the Executive Director - Tanya Shaltiel, and the entire Foundation Board for their energy and passion for the school and its values and their commitment towards achieving outstanding outcomes. I am very grateful to be working alongside them.

Parashat Terumah describes the building of the Mishkan in the desert. We learn about the importance of giving and the power of collective action. One interesting aspect of this Parasha is the fundraising campaign that Moshe conducted to collect the necessary materials for its construction. The Torah tells us that every person who had a generous heart brought their contributions. The gifts included a wide variety of materials, such as gold, silver, copper, precious stones, and fine fabrics. Interestingly, the Torah specifies that these materials were donated "by everyone whose heart was so moved". This implies that the donations were not collected through coercion or pressure, but rather through voluntary and heartfelt giving.

What can we learn from this about fundraising? First and foremost, we see that a successful fundraising campaign is not about forcing people to give, but rather about inspiring them to give. In the case of the Mishkan, people were moved to give by their love for Hashem and their desire to contribute to a communal project that would benefit the entire Jewish people.

Furthermore, the emphasis on the "generous heart" suggests that giving should not be viewed as a burden or obligation, but as a privilege and a joy. In our own Yavneh community, we can apply these principles by making sure that our fundraising efforts are focused on inspiring people to give from the heart. This means emphasising the positive impact that their contributions will have and creating a sense of shared responsibility and collective action By doing so, we can build a culture of giving that is grounded in generosity and gratitude, and that reflects the values of our tradition.

This beautiful concept has been truly demonstrated by all our donors who have joined the Yavneh Foundation, renewed their membership and made contributions for the benefit of our students. We are energised with the vigor with which each and every contribution to ongoing programs and projects.

Conversation with Head of Science, Hillel Solomon and Scholar in Residence, Rabbi Professor Sam Lebens

We were delighted to welcome a full house to hear a conversation between our Scholar in Residence, Rabbi Professor Sam Lebens and Yavneh's Head of Science, Hillel Solomon at the home of Naomi and Alan Moss. The dialogue was rich, engaging and thought provoking – revealing the compatibility between contemporary philosophy and science with authentic Jewish tradition. Rabbi Professor Lebens and Hillel explored the foundations and boundaries of Jewish belief, the integration of faith with a scientific worldview and the effective exploration of these ideas in an educational context. It was a wonderful showcase of the Torah and Maddah ethos to which Yavneh aspires.



Hillel Solomon said of the event "Rabbi Professor Lebens is a profound thinker who authentically engages with both Jewish and secular philosophy. Our discussion spanned from Crescas to Wittgenstein and from differing interpretations of revelation to Occam's Razor. As the Head of Science at Yavneh, I was particularly interested in his perspective on the coexistence of science and faith. Rabbi Lebens presented a compelling argument not only for the compatibility of scientific pursuit with Jewish faith, but also for the potential for faith in G-d to provide a foundational justification for the scientific enterprise, which can sometimes be lacking. When asked about fostering deep engagement with these matters in our students, Rabbi Lebens endorsed a comprehensive teaching approach that encompasses the history and philosophy of science."

The highly rewarding Scholar in Residence program was made possible by the generous donors to the Building Strong Foundations campaign in 2021. After the success of this inaugural program, Yavneh is looking forward to inviting more exceptional scholars to our school, becoming a hub for the meaningful exploration of important issues in modern Jewish life.









