




# AVERAGE STANDARDISED ASSESSMENT RESULTS FOR YEAR 7 & 9

#### Transition from Year 7 to Year 9:






Levels of student satisfaction is also monitored through regular meetings of the Student Leadership Team, and the College Captains meet weekly with the Principal to discuss student-based concerns. 
