It was an experience of overwhelming nachas, not only because they are all successful, articulate, but also because they are passionate Jews and Zionists, living in Israel and making a positive difference.

There was Hona, well known and loved by our Yavneh students. He is working at 'Unpacked', the foremost Israel education company in the world. Hona is the one writing Israel curriculum for day schools all over the diaspora. He is knowledgeable, nuanced, creative and passionate.

Keren recently married and her husband was serving in Gaza. Recently married she was so excited to tell me that former Chief Rabbi Lau was mesader kiddushin for her wedding. Keren works in 'High Tech' and was able to secure the job before her plane touched down at Ben Gurion. How? Because of Sam, another Yavneh graduate in High Tech who does everything he can to get other people jobs. This is after Sam served in the army, was injured in Tzuk Eitan in 2014, but still served out his entire army service. Just one of the many Giborim of Yavneh, who have served in the IDF.

Josh has only come to Israel recently but rolled up his sleeves to feed thousands of soldiers. Getting to the supermarket at 6am, loading cars and trucks with meat and veggies, Josh became 'Rosh Mangal' (head of BBQs) for the Chayalim in an out of Gaza. Sometimes returning home at 3am, Josh would organise and personally cook for hundreds of soldiers at a time. He got the job because he was Aussie, and by default 'good at BBQ'.

And then there is Nathan. The brains and eloquence behind Government Spokesperson Elon Levy's daily briefings, which he did while still working a full time job in, you guessed it, High tech.

And we spoke about others from their year level who are in Israel too, Avi Lewis (remember his brilliant blogs?) and Brian Sack (listed in Israeli Forbes top 30 under 30) and Talsi (doctor and soon to have a baby, beshaah tova). All living in Israel.

So here I was, sitting with five Yavneh graduates, all still best mates, all articulate, hard working and dedicated to Medinat and Am Yisrael. Almost 40% of this class of 2010 made Aliya.

On Pesach we tell the story of the Jewish people. We sit around the table and expound on collective memory, drink arba Kossot Geulah, and finish with Kos Eliyahu representing veheveiti – and I will bring you to the land. These Yavneh graduates do not just tell the story of our people, the ARE the story of our people! And every day they are writing the next chapter. They are more than letters in the scroll, they are the scroll. They are foundation and future of the Jewish people.

In the Haggadah we recite Mikra Bikkurim to tell our story in a way that is personal and national, connected both to Eretz Yisrael and Torat Yisrael, being grateful for the fruit we have and hopeful about the fruit yet to come. And so it is with our Yavneh students and Yavneh graduates. We should be (and I am) so proud of our kids who are learning Torah, living Torah, loving Israel and living in Israel.

May we all continue to have nachas from our students, past, present and future.

Wishing everyone a Chag Pesach Kasher ve Sameach,

[Saturday] night I didn't sleep much as Iran tried with all their might and power to intimidate, damage, maim and break Israel. And thank G-d it was a colossal failure! Aside from school being cancelled, Israel was back to its normal, bustling self within hours. Even the illegal parkers didn't get reprieve with a parking ticket officer doing the rounds at 8am the following morning.

The resilience of the Jewish people can be attributed to our strong sense of belonging and connection, anchored in shared, timeless values. Jewish people seek what they can give and contribute and spring into action even before being asked. Being in Israel has been affirming and invigorating with palpable unity and hope at every turn.

It has been a busy term and there is much more to come in the world of Yavneh Primary Sport!




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ROBOTICS at Leibler Yavneh College

VEHI SHE'AMDA והיא שעמדה

In Brit Bein Habetarim, the covenant made between G-d and Avraham, we encounter G-d's longterm plan, that includes a challenging diaspora as part of the promise of a homeland. As the Haggadah begins the Magid with "ברוך שומר הבטחתו לישראל ברוך הוא" (Blessed is he who keeps His promise to Israel, blessed be He.) This section culminates with the singing of והיא שמדה לאבותינו ("It is this that has stood by our fathers").

What is it? What is unique about this 'it"? In other words what is unique about the promise referred to in the words of Vehi She'amdah? The promises to the Avot were unconditional, as they connected with G-d independently, before the formal commandments were given. The Midrash suggests that the mitzvot they observed were mere shadows of the actual mitzvot that would later be instituted with the Torah. Hence, post-Torah promises to Bnei Yisrael hinge on adherence to these mitzvot and Torah study.

In Vehi She'amda we say that G-d rescues us from our enemy, Elie Wiesel, a Holocaust survivor, Nobel peace laureate and author, suggests that "our enemies are frequently remembered only for the evil they have inflicted on us." Were it not for us, who would remember Antiochus, Haman, Hitler and maybe one day Ayatollah Ali Khamenei. It appears says Wiesel, that "they wish to be part of our memory at any cost, anything is better than oblivion."

Throughout our history we have seen what stood in our way, in fact we are able to recognise what stands in our way as a nation, but we are resilient, and we find ways to overcome those hurdles because of the "IT" that promise made to Avtaham. Survival demands hope and faith. Looking back at history we see the many obstructions, sometimes they did not go away, but we outlived them. Resilience involves grit, the capacity to make mistakes, live with pain and achieve success despite it all.

The events of last Saturday night when Iran launched an unprecedented attack on Israel, showed us that the covenant is still there. The fact that most drones and various missiles were destroyed before landing was nothing short of a miracle. May this past the event be the last event that comes to mind when we sing Vehi She'amda at our Seder tables.

In our personal lives we have a personal 'vehi she'amda' moments. We overcome obstacles when we show resilience, tenacity and grit overcoming those obstacles in an attempt to achieve our personal goals.

This coming Seder night let us remember those who are in captivity praying for their miracle survival and Vehi She'amda moments. The hostages and their families endure a test pf faith and survival while we rally in prayer and solidarity, invoking the same promise of divine protection and deliverance that 'Vehi She'amda' symbolizes. The plight of the hostages in Gaza resonates with the themes of 'Vehi She'amda', serving as a contemporary reflection on the enduring struggle for survival and freedom faced by the Jewish people throughout history.

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EXCITING MATHS CHALLENGES

Have you ever been faced with a question and then asked yourself "where do I start"? This is the beginning of a wonderful challenge. In mathematics, whether it is a problem solving task, a modelling task or an investigation, we understand that by being challenged we develop and learn from the challenge itself. With a bit of luck, fortune and insight, we will be able to solve the problem as well! It has also been noted that a good problem is a question to which neither the solution nor the method of solution is obvious and hence the challenge.

This year the Year 9 Numb3er class, as well as a few select students from Years 7 and 8, have been entered into the Australian Maths Trust Maths Challenge. The Maths Challenge is a series of problems to develop mathematical skill and problem solving techniques. The questions can come from all strands of mathematics; algebra, numeracy, geometry etc. Students may work collaboratively or individually and are scored on their responses, with the marks sent to the Australian Maths Trust.

Benjamin Lyulev has reflected on his participation in the Challenge this year:

"Participating in the 2024 Math's Challenge organized by the Australian Math's Trust has been an exhilarating journey that has pushed the boundaries of my mathematical prowess. The challenges presented in this year's competition were not just about solving equations but about unlocking the creativity and critical thinking skills that lie within each of us. The variety of problems catered to my interests and abilities, ensuring that every step of the challenge felt engaging and rewarding.

Teachers receive material to give out in class, and we had time in class to do some questions. These questions were not straightforward, but rather deep problem-solving questions which required more than just a couple algorithms. These questions tested both our knowledge of math but also our creativity and critical thinking. We had to go outside the box for many questions. We worked in groups and enjoyed how creative every question was. For example, question 2 "Drop Bears" was talking about a tree were going left is -10 and going right -11. These questions really tested our knowledge and creativity to get the right answers."

We wish the students well in their Challenge.
