A very belated welcome back to Term 4!

Starting the term with Sukkot and half weeks has meant it's been quite a while since our last Kesher. We have ensured this is a bumper issue to catch you up on all the happenings at Yavneh over the past month and to give you something to read and enjoy on these long, glorious Shabbatot.

Yavneh! Among other things, our kids have shaken lulavim, hopped sukkot, beaten aravot, sat VCE trial exams and real exams and hosted Emmy Monash in our sukkah too.

As we were not at school on October 7, our Yavneh students commemorated the first Yartzheit of the 1200 beloved people murdered on Hoshana Rabba, the day closest to the actual Yartzheit of Shmini Azeret.

In our primary school, the entire Sefer Tehillim was divided up and said at a moving assembly. Every student is to be commended for how seriously and spriritually they read their perek. We are so proud of them!

And after an extensive and exuberant Hoshana Rabba davening, our high school students divided up

Rambam's Sefer HaMitzvot, with students learning each mitzvah in memory of a particular person murdered on October 7. This has been the third major learning project our students have completed since October 7, after having done the entire Mishna for the Shloshim and all of Neviim for the 'week of goodness'.

The students then danced with the Torah, covered in a new Since our last episode so much has happened here at me'il purchased through the 'Simchat Torah Project' of Mizrachi. The me'il has been embroidered with the name of יעקב איליאן, one of the many souls of the many citizens, chayalim and chatufim who have died, al Kiddush Hashem, on and since the events of that horrific black Shabbat.

> On the front of the me'il is embraided a phrase from Kohelet:

> ועת רקוד: עת ספוֹד "There is a time to mourn, and a time to dance"

Yavneh Principals message

In planning the program we were conscious of having to hold two conflicting emotions. On the one hand, it is the one-year anniversary of the darkest day for Israel and for Jews since the Holocaust. But at the same time Hoshana Rabba is a Yom Tov in the middle of Zman Simchateinu – the time of our happiness.

In Days of Awe in Times of War, Rav Doron Peretz reflects on the challenge of simultaneously feeling contradictory emotions;

"When we somehow managed to get through the celebration of Yonatan's wedding with his brother Daniel missing, only 10 days after that tragic day, I understood the dichotomy of suffering and celebration. It helped me to understand something from Kohelet. King Shlomo, highlights in Perek 3 that for ever time, and every hour beneath the sun, there are different experiences: a time of life and a time of death, a time to plant and a time to uproot, a time of peace and a time of war, a time to mourn and a time to celebrate. I had always previously understood that Shlomo was talking about different times in our lives. Life can be divided into good times and bad times - sometimes it's a time for happiness and growth. Sometimes, it's a time for mourning and destruction. I understood for the first time in my life that this is not necessarily the case. Perhaps Shlomo, in his great wisdom was teaching us that sometimes all of these things happen together. They literally happen at the same time. Life is a package deal

This Simchat Torah, we are going to have it both ways. We will dance with every fibre of our being, celebrating the privilege of being a Jew and at the same time, we will cry, and feel the pain of this last year and what happened last year at this time.

It will be both a time to mourn and a time to dance. A time to feel the pain and a time to celebrate the privilege. A time to laugh and a time to cry. A time to feel close and a time to feel from a distance. We live in Hashem's world. In Hashem's world somehow things are always okay, even when they are not."

Sometimes we need to do hard things when things in the world are not okay, like mourning and dancing at the same time. But we do these hard things, with pride and with fervour. For this is what it means to be a Jew. Here at Yavneh, our family is made up of Jews and non-Jews. We have many non-Jewish staff on both our campuses.

I want to acknowledge that while different, the past year has been difficult for them too.

Recruiting and hiring teachers has always been challenging given how many teachers are leaving the profession, but post October 7 it is even harder. When some applicants find out that we are a Zionist school, they politely pull their application citing bogus reasons such as 'too much of a commute', when the drive would be significantly shorter from where they currently work.

I'm glad these applicants pull out. We do not hide our Jewish and Zionist identity and if they are on the wrong side of history, we don't want them in our school and teaching precious our Jewish children.

But this is not the case for the teachers who are here, and thus I want to take a few minutes to recognise and thank our non-Jewish teachers, administrators and support staff here at Yavneh.

We need to know how lucky we are to have these people at our school.

These teachers have not just been staunch supporters of Israel while at school, but have advocated for and defended Israel to their families and friends outside the Jewish Yavneh bubble too. Many of them have said that they have lost friends because of their unwavering support for Israel and Zionism. These teachers have attended information sessions and asked for reading material to increase their knowledge of Israel's history and circumstance. One example is Ms Joubert, our brilliant and colourful Head of Primary, who attended the October 7 commemoration in Moorabbin and read Tehillim in transliteration for our Yartzheit assembly. That morning, she watched the 'We Will Dance Again' documentary and cried for hours. When I commented that the community October 7 commemoration was quite lengthy, Ms Joubert said that "I had to stay and sing Hatikva". And then she told me about a friendship that is no longer for they could not understand Israel's imperative to defend her citizens from terrorists.

Let's not focus on the betrayal of the many, but rather the unwavering friendship of the few; the friendship of our teachers and colleagues who are treasured members of the Yavneh family.

We see you, we thank you, we salute you.

Together, our Yavneh family is strong, and we look to the future with gratitude and hope.

Parshat Noach - Priorities

At the end of the parsha, the Torah says that "Noach – the man of the land – planted a vineyard". Rashi comments on the words "the man of the land" (ish ha'adama) that this connotes that Noach was defined by the land. Noach was the "master of the land".

The Ramban notes that this usage sets a precedent for such constructs elsewhere in Tanach. The person — "ish" — is defined by what comes after it. The Ramban cites the additional example of "ish haElokim" by Moshe – the man of G-d, meaning a person who defined himself by G-d. Noach, on the other hand, became a person who was defined by the land.

Earlier, Rashi comments on the expression "vaYachel Noach". Rashi explains that the word "vaYachel" connotes that Noach profaned himself (from the root 'chulin' – non-sacred) because his initial planting after the Flood should have been something other than a vineyard.

If we ask the question "Should Noach have planted a vineyard?" the answer is most certainly yes. After all, we must ponder – where did Noach get the vines from, if everything on earth had been totally destroyed? The answer is that together with all the animals which Noach brought onto the ark, he took seeds of every kind of tree and plant, to eventually remedy the agricultural destruction that took place during the flood. There is no question that eventually Noach was supposed to

replant vineyards. The criticism which Rashi cites, is criticizing Noach for making the vineyard his initial planting. Rabbi Frand comments on this Rashi and quotes Rav Yeruchum Levovitz who explains that this teaches a lesson regarding the importance of proper priorities.

There are many things which we must do in this world. We have many obligations. But priorities DEFINE what a person will become. The pasuk says "vaYachel Noach ish haAdamah". Our Sages note that earlier Noach was referred to as a pure and noble spirit (Noach ish Tzadik tamim). Look what happened to him! Suddenly he is called a "man of the earth." Where did he go wrong? The Rabbi's explain that his spiritual descent was extremely subtle. It was not a dramatic rebellion or change of lifestyle. Heaven Forbid! Noach merely misplaced his priorities and planted what should have been a later crop ahead of what should have been earlier plantings. Noach's inappropriate first priority became his defining essence as mentioned in the previously quoted Rashi. The vineyard defined him because that became the number one priority in his life.

This teaches us how crucial it is to maintain the correct priorities in life.

They suggest not over emphasising the preparation process as children live in the present time and their ability to settle calmly all depends on the way the transition is "thoughtful[ly] and respectful[ly]" considered and planned.

It is up to us as parents, guardians and educators, to set our children up for success. This includes role modelling positive behaviours and mindsets. In order to support smooth transitions into the new year and new beginnings, it is important to be enthusiastic and use encouraging language, so the children are able to mimic these behaviours and feel comfortable with the new changes that approach them.

We wish all children and families across the ELC and Elsternwick campus בהצלחה with the rest of this year and hope that whatever change and transition comes your way, you can embrace it with courage and contentment.






Year 12: Guard of Honour

On Hoshana Raba this year, we have come together ahead of the first yahrtzeit of all the Kedoshim who were killed on Oct 7/Simchat Torah last year. After a rousing Tefillah full of singing and dancing, Hallel, Hoshaanot and more – we gathered in the Lamm Hall for our commemoration. The theme was 'עת ספוד, עת ספוד, עת ספוד, עת ספוד, עת ספוד, על 'there's a time to mourn, and a time to dance'. Inspired by the message from Rav Doron Perez ש' of World Mizrachi – father of Daniel Perez הי"ד – murdered soldier and still hostage (as of the writing of this article), we enter into Shmini Atzeret/Simchat Torah, holding both these emotions.

We then undertook a beautiful initiative for the עליית נשמות of our slain brothers and sisters. The entire secondary school – staff and students – completed learning the entire ספר המצוות של הרמב"ם – the Sefer Hamitzvot of the Rambam. Every student and staff member was allocated Mitzvot and we learned them individually and in chavrutot. We concluded with a Siyum and Kaddish.

We then came together for a tisch in a way that only Yavneh can. We sang words of Tefillah asking Hashem to save us – and then moved into songs of joy. Poignantly we danced with the Torah mantle designed by Rav Doron – symbolising that this Simchat Torah and this Sukkot we dance with the pain. The students were unbelievably rousing in their profound emotions of both solemnity and joy. A true simcha emanated from the hall as the students sang their hearts out and danced – united and proud to be Jews, proud of our people and our homeland, thankful for the Torah and Mitzvot and connected so deeply to Hashem.
