

The Beauty of Boundaries and the Joy of Just Being

This week's parsha, Parshat Chukat opens with one of the most famously confusing mitzvot in the Torah: the Parah Adumah - the red cow. It purifies those who are impure, but somehow makes impure the people who are involved in preparing it. It's really topsy turvy, so much so that even Shlomo HaMelech, wisest of all men, said he couldn't figure it out.

Rashi jumps right in, quoting the Midrash: "Because the nations of the world (and the Satan) will taunt you saying, 'What is this commandment and what reason is there for it? $^{\prime}$ - therefore the Torah writes, 'It is a chok — it's a decree from Me, and you have no permission to question it."

It's the ultimate "Because I said so."

Fundamentally, in education (and parenting), we're not in the business of dodging questions. Quite the opposite. At Yavneh, we're all about the how and the why. We love that our students ask and debate. Questioning is a Jewish superpower!. At the same time, our teachers explicitly teach, explain, model, and then model again. Whether it's how to structure a paragraph, how to parse a verb in Chumash, or how to figure out the gradient of a line — our teachers are experts in making the complex make sense.

But sometimes, explanations muddy the waters and just get in the way. There are times, like with the Parah Adumah, when what children need is a firm, loving boundary without going into the hows and whys. Like when they ask for a snack in the supermarket and you say, "It's not kosher," and the conversation ends. Or when they want ice cream ten minutes after schnitzel. "You're still fleishik." End of story. These are parenting chok moments. Beautiful, clear, and (if we're lucky) argument-proof.

And that is actually one of the quiet beauties of childhood — that

"because I said so" can suffice. That not everything needs to be fully explained or rationalised. Children find security in boundaries. They thrive when they know the rules and can rest inside them.

Another beauty of childhood is simply... childhood. Playing, imagining, pretending. Not trying to be older than they are. Not fast-forwarding to grown-up problems. Just being.

One of the standout moments for me this term was going to Year 12 Zionist camp. Students always tell us that camp is one of the highlights of their Yavneh journey. And it's easy to see why. Aside from the inspiring tochniyot (thank you Noah E and the incredible JLife team), the kids bond. Deeply. Meaningfully. And they bond over things that are joyfully simple. They bond by making Shabbat food together — yes, really! Our Year 12s prep the cholent, yupchik, matbucha, and Shabbat morning cakes. There's something powerful about watching teenagers take pride in creating food for their peers, preparing for Shabbat together with intention and teamwork. nd then there are the games.

Once dinner and singing at the tisch wraps up on Friday night, out come the board games and card games. Some kids play Rummikub or Bananagrams. Others play endless rounds of Spit or Bluff. And they play for hours. No phones. No screens. Just kids being kids, laughing, concentrating, talking. Some tables get loud, others stay quiet. You can tell they're in their element.

We always face the same dilemma: it's 1:30 am, sometimes even 2, and the kids are still playing, still bonding. Should we send them to bed? They need to be up for Shacharit at 9 and we have a full Shabbat day of programming planned. But they're so happy. So connected. So in the moment.

These moments remind us of how much kids love being kids. How boundaries and structure give them room to flourish. And how sometimes, the best thing we can do as educators and parents is not push them to understand everything or do everything, but to let them enjoy the stage they're in — while setting the right limits around them

Not everything needs to be explained right away. Not everything has to make perfect sense. Sometimes the best kind of love says: not now, not yet — because I said so.

And then other times we explain everything. That's the dance of parenting. Of teaching. Of raising children to be confident and whole. At Yavneh, we honour both sides. There are times when explanations are absolutely necessary. When we teach, we teach the how and the why. We don't rely on osmosis or intuition.

We break it down, step by step. We teach explicitly, in General Studies and in Jewish Studies. We don't have open-plan classrooms. We believe in teacher-led learning, with students seated at desks, engaged in structured, intentional lessons. Because research, and experience, tells us this works. And because our students deserve the best.

And we also understand that not everything in life is about explanation. Some things are about emunah, about trust, about knowing that even when we don't get it, we are still held by something meaningful.

As we head into the holidays, let's hold on to that balance. Let's give our kids experiences that are inclusive, uplifting, and good for the soul. Let's let them be kids in all the best ways. Let's remind them that they must act as proud Jews not just when they're in school uniform, but always. At home, on camp, on holidays, everywhere! Wishing you a holiday filled with rest, joy, and perhaps even the occasional chok.

(And no, you can't have ice cream. You're still fleishik.)
















Year 2 Chumash Learning – What a Journey!
















Secondary MeWs

Year 9 students spent a busy five days in the city, learning about its history, exploring careers, visiting historic sites, and discovering some of the issues that challenge people in the CBD.








































Elite Energy


