I hope everyone enjoyed a restful and refreshing break and have returned to Term 3 full of energy and ready to learn!

Over the holidays, I found myself reflecting on the remarkable resilience and strength of Israel, especially during the challenging times in which we find ourselves. One idea has been resonating deeply for me, the notion that Israel is an extraordinary example of balancing individualism and collectivism. These are two forces that are both essential for any thriving society, yet sometimes in tension with one another.

Israel is renowned around the world as the "Start-Up Nation." It is a country driven by creativity, innovation, and technological brilliance. That culture of innovation emerges from individualism, from the freedom to think differently, to ask questions, to challenge assumptions, and to explore new ideas. It is this spirit of curiosity and ingenuity that has led to some of Israel's most extraordinary achievements. We marvel at the sophisticated technology that has allowed Israel to defend itself, such as the advanced intelligence operations that have neutralised threats from Hezbollah, or daring missions into Iran that have disrupted nuclear capabilities and eliminated top scientists involved in hostile agendas. These feats are not the products of conformity, but rather the fruits of minds willing to think beyond the conventional, to invent new tools, and to solve problems in creative and courageous ways.

But there is another side to Israel's strength, equally vital, and that is collectivism. Israel's courage and resilience do not come only from technological prowess, they come from a profound sense of shared responsibility and collective purpose. In moments of crisis, Israelis come together, willing to sacrifice comfort and personal plans for the security and wellbeing of the nation. It is the belief that we are part of

something larger than ourselves, and that our true strength lies in unity. This week's double parasha, Matot-Masei, captures this delicate balance beautifully.

As Bnei Yisrael stand on the edge of entering the Promised Land, the tribes of Reuven and Gad approach Moshe with a request. They wish to settle on the eastern side of the Jordan River, outside the boundaries of Eretz Yisrael, because the land there is especially suitable for their cattle. Moshe's response is pointed and challenging:

"?הַאַחֵיכֶם יָבֹאוּ לַמִּלְחָמָה וְאַתֶּם תֵּשְׁבוּ פֹה"?

"Shall your brothers go to war while you remain here?" (Bamidbar 32:6) This verse has become one of the key texts referenced in contemporary debates about Chareidi enlistment in the IDF. But beyond that specific issue, it speaks to a timeless truth about balancing individual desires with communal obligations. Moshe is not dismissing the personal needs of Reuven and Gad, but he is reminding them that while individual pursuits and personal comfort are significant, there is also a collective

responsibility that no one can ignore. Reuven and Gad ultimately agree to fight alongside their brothers before returning to settle their own lands. In doing so, they model how individual aspirations can coexist with communal duty when approached with integrity and commitment. Yet Moshe adds another layer of wisdom to this arrangement. He decides that half of the tribe of Menashe should also

remain on the eastern side of the

Jordan. Menashe is the quintessential example of what it means to sacrifice for the good of the other. Menashe was the older of Yosef's two sons. When Yaakov came to bless Yosef's sons, he crossed his hands and gave the primary blessing to the younger brother, Ephraim, instead of to Menashe, the firstborn. Yet Menashe did not complain or protest. He accepted the decision with humility and grace, placing his brother's wellbeing above his own pride. This is why, to this day, we bless our children that they should be like Ephraim and Menashe, two brothers who simply wanted what was best for one another, without rivalry or resentment.

In assigning half of Menashe to stay with Reuven and Gad, Moshe ensures that the regions east of the Jordan remain connected to the rest of the nation, preventing isolation. But he is also sending a deeper message about unity, brotherhood, and the willingness to support each other for the sake of the collective good. Menashe embodies the balance between standing strong as an individual and being devoted to the welfare of the larger community.

Israel today continues to live out that same balance, fiercely committed to individual brilliance and innovation, while equally rooted in the solidarity and mutual responsibility that have sustained the Jewish people through every generation.

This is a powerful and relevant lesson for us here at Yavneh. As educators, we are devoted to nurturing each student as an individual, recognising their unique talents, passions, and aspirations. We believe deeply in helping every child discover their path and flourish in the areas where they shine brightest.

At the same time, we are a community. We are not simply individuals gathered under one roof, we are a family bound by shared values, shared history, and a shared vision for the future.

Our greatest strength as a school comes from working together, supporting one another, and creating an environment where everyone feels valued, respected, and connected.


This message is particularly significant as we enter the last full term of VCE. One of the fascinating aspects of the VCE system is that individual students often perform better when the entire cohort does well. The more our Year 12 students share resources, collaborate, and lift each other up, the greater the benefit to each individual's outcomes. The same principle applies to our broader school community. Each child's experience is enriched when the collective environment is one of kindness, inclusion, and mutual respect.

We are currently in the period of the Three Weeks leading up to Tisha B'Av, a time when we reflect on the dangers of sinat chinam, baseless hatred, which led to the destruction of the Beit HaMikdash. The antidote is ahavat chinam, boundless love, and a renewed commitment to unity and inclusion. It is a call to strengthen our sense of collective purpose, even as we continue to honour and support each individual.

As we begin this new term, may we carry forward the lessons of Matot-Masei, of balancing individual dreams with communal responsibility. May we nurture the unique spark in each of our students while working together to build a school community that is greater than the sum of its parts.

Wishing everyone a term filled with learning, growth, and connection.

Wishing us all a meaningful and inspiring term.




















# 100 Days of Prep!

Mazel Tov to all participants for their outstanding contributions and achievements and for making this year's







#### **OPEN DAYS 2025**

#### Getting the most out of an Open Day

Most institutional Open Days are held in late July and August (see over the page for Open Day dates). However, you are more than welcome to contact an institution to arrange a visit any time.

#### What happens on an Open Day?

On Open Day you can visit an institution when it's at its best. Everyone is there – academics, lecturers, current students, and information officers. More importantly, you can talk with academics, lecturers, and current students about what certain courses are actually like, and what is required to get into them.

#### Who should attend an Open Day?

Anyone who is considering studying at a tertiary level in the next few years should attend.

#### Why should you attend an Open Day?

Apart from the opportunity to obtain course information there are many other reasons why attending an Open Day is a good idea:

- You are going to feel more comfortable arriving at a university or TAFE institute on the first day of classes if you
  have been there before.
- What is really involved in the course or courses you are interested in?
- If you have to move away from home, where are you going to live?
- Will you be happier studying in a large metropolitan institution or a smaller, perhaps rural institution?
- What does the place 'feel' like? Is it a bustling environment with lots of activity or a quieter, more relaxed campus set in landscaped grounds?
- · How are you going to get there? Is it close to public transport or should you start saving now for a car?

If you don't know the answers to any of these questions, then you should attend an Open Day!

#### How to make the best of Open Days

To make your Open Day visits fun and informative, here are some pointers:

- Write down a list of questions you would like to ask about particular courses.
- Be there early. Crowds tend to develop as the day progresses.
- On arrival, get a map from a central point and ask for directions to the relevant faculties or schools.
- Ask questions!
- Don't spend the day collecting printed information only. Use the opportunity to speak directly with academics before applications close.
- Introduce yourself to selection officers if you feel it is appropriate, but don't be pushy.
- · Check out the residential colleges, if available. After all, it is you that will be living there.
- Walk around the campus. Have a good look! See what sporting facilities and other services are available.
- · Enjoy the visit!

Not everyone can attend every Open Day and various Institutions hold their Open Days on the same date! If you can't attend an Open Day and you are interested in a particular institution, you may visit at other times. If you wish to speak to a particular person, it is essential to make an appointment first.
