

The Yavneh Academy Journey

A number of years back, I was on the phone to a mother whose child had recently joined Yavneh from interstate. She was excited about the new learning that her child was bringing home which already had surpassed her own Jewish literacy, and simultaneously lamented about her inability to join her child's journey of learning. It was at that moment that the notion of the Yavneh Academy was conceived – the creation of a space geared towards families and alumni of our College, which would allow members of the wider "village" who are not students at Yavneh to tap into our incredible resources to develop their skills and knowledge in Torah as well as find deeper inspiration and meaning in their Judaism.

When we launched the idea to parents, and sought expressions of interest in joining the Yavneh Academy committee earlier this year, we were overwhelmed by the amount of responses we received, and a dedicated group of parents and alumni aligned around the vision and goals of this project, which included:

- · Inspiring Yavneh parents and alumni in their Yiddishkeit;
- Connecting parents to Yavneh's teachers;
- Fostering partnership between Yavneh, its parent body and alumni:
- Exposing parents and alumni to learning innovations and innovators at Yavneh; and
- Carving out a reputation for Yavneh as venue for serious Torah learning.

Over the course of the last term and a half of the Yavneh Academy, we have enjoyed the company of almost 100 participants (many of whom are repeat attendees) from our College community, and beyond (who, by the way, are very welcome!) as they have joined presentations by Yavneh teachers, heads of department, our

principal as well as visiting scholars. Topics on offer ranged from skills based (Hebrew 101, the Lifnai v'Lifnim method, accessing the machzor) to contemporary (the Iran war, pre-Chagim learning, antisemitism) to areas of interest (Jewish medical ethics, philosophy, history, meditation) and beyond.

This project is currently in its infancy, and we are excited to steer it in directions that will provide a valued service to our community, and further strengthen its core objectives. At this stage, the committee has discussed running our weekly evening program only in the winter terms (Terms 2 and 3 of the school year), which means that we will conclude the current learning schedule at the end of this term. For the summer program, which we aim to commence in Term 4, we will be looking to pivot in a manner that will open our Academy to those families and alumni whose lifestyle didn't suit the format of the winter series. Stay tuned for updates, or better yet, be a part of crafting the next stage, by getting in touch with your ideas! As a school, our core focus is our students. Beyond the benefit it provides families, the Yavneh Academy enhances the community in

which our students live, the adults with whom they interact and provides them with ongoing connection for the alumni that they will become. Mezuzah Moments in JKG

In JK Gimmel, we have been learning about what the Sofer does- a specially trained scribe who writes a Torah, a Mezuzah, Tefilin and a Megillah. The children were shown a real Klaf (parchment) made from skin from a Kosher animal. The Klaf is a fundamental part of the Mezuzah and we were so appreciative to welcome Ari's Aba- Sam who is a Sofer. He showed us a Klaf and demonstrated writing Hebrew letters with great care and concentration.





The Sofer writes a Mezuzah with a feather Kulmus and the ink. We learned that a Mezuzah starts with the letter Shin and contains the Shema- reminding us to love Hashem with all our heart. We explored how a Mezuzah is placed on the doorposts ofevery Jewish house. The children practiced writing with a feather and wrote their own Klaf using real ink. This activity provided the children to use their fine motor skills and practice proper pencil grip- Just like a real Sofer! We placed their Klaf in their own Mezuzah which they created using various art mediums.











Teaching children about core Jewish traditions helps build a strong foundation of identity, belonging, and purpose. The Mezuzah reminds the children that they are part of something meaningful—and that their values are carried with them each day, and can help them grow into confident, compassionate and resilient individuals.


Here's what some of Year 2 had to say:

Year 6 Chumash Journey

As the Year 6s are well into their final semester of Primary School, their Torah study is accelerating at a remarkable rate. Our study of Chumash in 6A this term has focused on the end of Parashat Vayishlach with the death of Rachel and Yitzchak and Eisav's rather confusing family tree. Both Year 6 classes will soon be celebrating a Siyum on Parashat Vayishlach as well as completing the first 'L'havin' workbook for this year. While everyone enjoys a good party, the message of the Siyum is that we are never satisfied with just one section of Torah; rather we must continue learning with even greater enthusiasm and curiosity.

Prior to the departure of the Tzevet earlier this month, Year 6 were privileged to have several sessions with them, learning in a more informal setting and enjoying their youthful energy. While we are certainly missing Tzviki, Nachshon, Niv and Nofar, we look forward the new Tzevet arriving soon so we can continue to gain inspiration and take in the aura of Eretz Yisrael. Our Tisha B'Av learning incorporated a project about different tragedies throughout Jewish history. Students researched the eras of the Maranos, the Cantonists, the Crusades and the Holocaust, with specific focus on the traumatic impact these tragedies wrought on children.





The Year 6 Gemara journey continues with deeper discussions and debates about Tefillah, and whether or not someone can make up a Tefillah that was missed out. After a series of questions, analysis, comparisons and quotes from Tanach, the Gemara reaches the conclusion that one can make up a missed tefillah if was skipped by accident. But no such allowance is granted if one deliberately missed Tefillah. One of the students asked, how can we be sure if someone is being honest with themselves that they missed the Tefillah by accident? This sparked an engaging conversation about honesty and sincerity in praying to Hashem.

This week 6B were very privileged to be visited by my wife Morah Esti and our baby Yaakov. Morah Esti was a much beloved JS teacher at Yavneh from 2009–2019 and she enjoyed meeting the current Year 6s and figuring out whose siblings she had taught. Baby Yaakov brought smiles to everyone's faces as he joined the learning in his own unique way.


I wish Year 6 continued Hatzlacha in their Torah learning and all for their school endeavours.

In recent weeks, Year 7 and 8 students have excelled in a variety of sports at the Beachside District Winter Round Robins. Hours of focused team training during PE lessons prepared students for the lofty level of competition. In addition to the pleasing results, the determination, togetherness and spirit displayed by Yavneh students proved a source of great pride for the whole school community.

Yavneh's talents in table tennis were on full display, with all boys' teams winning their divisions and thus qualifying for Regionals in October - a magnificent feat! A special thanks to experienced Maccabi coach Ken Dawber whose masterclasses supported students in fast tracking their skill development and knowledge of the game, ultimately playing an integral part in their success.

Despite competing against schools with basketball academies and elite athletic profiles, Yavneh students played to their strengths and left it all out on the court in an effort filled with heart and grit. The boys' teams were expertly mentored by Yavneh's own Music Department maestro and basketball guru Nick Karasavvidis. The year 7 girls team exceeded even their own expectations, narrowly missing a finals spot, winning their first two group games, before falling valiantly to strong opposition in the finals-deciding fixtures. The passion, cohesion and skill demonstrated by each member of the team was developed and supported throughout an intensive training block run by coach Gili Smolboard, courtesy of the Maccabi Pathways Program.

On the futsal courts, both our boys and girls teams competed strongly, with a plethora of team and individual highlights, such as Caleb F's stunning strike and Lior V's hat-trick.

Finally, the Year 7 Footy team had a remarkable run at Regionals, claiming comprehensive victories in two of their three group matches to finish second in their pool. Asher W, Shua S, and Levi T were the multiple goal-kickers on the day, while Charlie B, Zac A, Gidi G and Gabriel B-D were others who put in standout performances.

Guest Speaker: Mr Yusuf Hana

This week, select Year 11 and 12 students had the rare privilege of hearing from the talented artist Mr Yusuf Hana. Born in Egypt to a Muslim father of Turkish descent and an Ethiopian mother, Yusuf's early life was shaped by rich cultural and religious influences. After spending time in an Islamist organisation, he was conscripted into the Egyptian Army and sent to the Egypt-Gaza border. There, Yusuf encountered Israeli soldiers whose friendliness and generosity challenged his perspective on Israelis and Jews.



This encounter prompted deep reflection, and Yusuf shared his confusion with his mother, who revealed for the first time that she had Jewish origins—a revelation that further reshaped Yusuf's understanding of identity and faith. His questioning of former beliefs led to life-threatening consequences, including an attempt on Yusuf's life by relatives who poisoned his tea.

Fleeing Egypt, Yusuf eventually settled in Australia, where he, his wife, and their five children have embraced the Jewish community. Yusuf shared with our students his deep love for Judaism, the Jewish people, and Israel, encouraging them to take pride in who they are and what they represent—now, more than ever.
