mighty nation; I am the L-rd, in its time I will hasten it."
Extraordinarily, in 1948 Israel was home to 800,000 people. Less than one lifetime later, Israel's population has surpassed 10 million and continues to grow rapidly. Our entire history, theology, and sacred texts declare in perfect unison: there will be dark times, but the light will always come—and it will always overcome the darkness.

Consider this: as of Yom Hazikaron 2025, the IDF records 25,417 people who have fallen in defence of Israel since the first modern Jewish neighbourhoods were rebuilt outside Jerusalem's walls in 1860. By contrast, in just two days at Babyn Yar outside Kiev in 1941, 33,771 Jews were slaughtered. Every life lost is infinite and the destruction of an entire world—but the contrast reminds us that the cost resulting from 165 years of rebuilding our homeland does not equal the cost in lives of 48 hours of exile. Moreover, unlike in exile, those who rise to destroy us now find us not defenceless, but ready and able to defend ourselves with a determination unparalleled in the history of nations. This week, in reference to the Israeli strike on Hamas's leadership in Qatar, the Prime Minister of Israel Binyamin Netanyahu declared: "Our enemies must know one thing—since the creation of the State of Israel, the blood of Jews is not free!"

This is the most trying moment of our generation, but we are rising to that challenge. We must do everything in our power to bring our hostages home and honour our fallen with dignity. We must comfort those in pain. And yes, we must fight with all our strength so that those who have murdered Jewsor who would—can never, ever rise up to destroy us again. Remember, we know how this will ultimately end. The promises of our Torah, our prophets, and our ancestors stand as unwavering witnesses to our eternal story. As Yeshayahu assures us in the Haftorah: "Violence shall no longer be heard in your land, neither robbery nor destruction within your borders, and you shall call salvation your walls and your gates praise." It is surely no coincidence that the Hebrew word for "violence" in this verse is none other than "Hamas." May we soon see this prophecy fulfilled and may true and everlasting peace reign forever.



In addition to supporting students, we recognise the importance of challenging our academically gifted students, by exposing them to more complex texts and ideas than those that feature in the classroom. Top performing students are identified and form part of the 'JS Scholars' cohort who are provided with 1:1 and small group chavrutas with the members of the Israeli Tzevet, where they explore a Sefer of their choosing, studying it in its original language and exploring the rich themes that emerge. Additionally, the JS Scholars are granted opportunities to join specialised sessions by visiting experts to the College. This year we have had Professor Chaim Sukenik from Machon Lev, former principal Rabbi David Debow, scholar in residence Rabbi Professor Sam Lebens as well as (just this Friday) Rachel Danzinger Sharanski, who have presented to this cohort.

Every student is an entire world, and our goal at Yavneh is for them to feel that in our eyes this is not an empty statement but a lived mantra. Whether it is in the form of a well-differentiated lesson, the patient support of our JYes staff, or the enrichment program for JS Scholars, we aim to provide every one of our students with the opportunity to discover their unique place in the world of Torah.



Matter That Matters: Year 3 Gets Messy with Oobleck!

In Year 3, we have been learning about States of Matter as part of our Science unit. We are exploring how a change of state between solid and liquid can be caused by adding or removing heat energy. Students explored how materials can behave in different ways. To investigate, we made Oobleck and tested whether it was a solid or a liquid. Following the scientific method, students wrote a procedure text that included a hypothesis, steps, observations, and results. The class discovered that Oobleck is in fact a Non-Newtonian, which means it behaves like both a solid and a liquid depending on how it is handled. The children thoroughly enjoyed this messy, hands-on experiment and developed a deeper understanding of matter through a fun approach to learning.




Niche Player of the Week Noah G, Year 8 Student
